

Sharing Time: June 2014


Week 4: "Family history work connects me to my ancestors."

Encourage understanding:

Before Sunday I would ask your trusty music leader to prepare to teach the song "Family history—I am doing it". They might already have visuals for this song. If not, a simple poster with each line of the song written would help with this activity.

Follow the official outline. I have included the entire story found in the outline. I have added graphics and numbered the pages. You can either place these on the board as you tell the story, or you can place them in a binder so it reads like a book. You can also print larger graphics on our website under the tab Sharing time/Free stuff.

Every time the words "sing or singing" appear follow the outline by singing another line of the song.




Additional activity:

Call up 5-10 children (depending on time) to the front of the room. Continue discussing the part of the outline about how their great grandchildren connected to their ancestors because of their love of singing.

- Have each child think of something that their family loves to do, that they could pass on.
- Start with the first child and have them say: "Our family loves to..."
- The second child in line will say: "Our family loves to..." then they have to repeat the previous child's activity and add one of their own. See if the last child can remember all of the family activities.

Encourage application:



children to love & singing. 🎵




Today her great-great-great-
